Improving Access to Justice for Immigrant Children, Immigrant Crime Victims and Children in Immigrant Families

- NGO Partners
 - Outreach to programs serving immigrant and LEP children, victims, and families
 - Identify barriers to accessing the courts
 - Meet with court partner and state judicial leadership team to develop and implement plans for improving access to justice
 - Carry out plan collaborating with other NGOs in the state

Improving Access to Justice for Immigrant Children, Immigrant Crime Victims and Children in Immigrant Families

- Court Partners and Judicial Leadership Team
 - Meet with NGO partners to discuss barriers to access to justice for immigrant and LEP litigants
 - Identify areas in which local courts and courts statewide could implement improvements
 - Identify ways courts can work with NGO partners
 - Develop and implement a work plan for implementing identified improvements
