



## Update on Asylum Seekers Who are Fleeing Domestic and Gender Based Violence in Their Home Countries: Relief Available

NIWAP will continue providing up-to-date technical assistance on matters related to domestic violence victims who have fled domestic and sexual violence in their home countries. In light of recent action in the *Matter of A-B-*, practitioners are reminded of the importance to screen for multiple avenues of relief when working survivors of domestic and sexual violence seeking gender based asylum. Some victims will have also suffered abuse or violence within the United States and may qualify to file U Visas, T Visas or VAWA self-petitions. Others may have been abused, abandoned or neglected by a parent in the U.S. or abroad and may be eligible for Special Immigrant Juvenile Status. For screening tools, see:
