Several risk factors have been associated with increased risk of homicides (murders) of immigrant_women in violent relationships. We cannot predict what will happen in your case, but we would like you to be aware of the danger of homicide in situations of abuse and for you to see how many of the risk factors apply to your situation.

Using the calendar, please mark the approximate dates during the past year when you were abused by your partner or ex-partner. Write on that date how bad the incident was according to the following scale:

1. Slapping, pushing; no injuries and/or lasting pain

- 2. Punching, kicking; bruises, cuts, and/or continuing pain
- 3. "Beating up"; severe contusions, burns, broken bones
- 4. Threat to use weapon; head injury, internal injury, permanent injury, miscarriage or choking* (use a © in the date to indicate choking/strangulation/cut off your breathing- example 4©)
- 5. Use of weapon; wounds from weapon (If **any** of the descriptions for the higher number apply, use the higher number.)

Mark **Yes** or **No** for each of the following. "He" refers to your husband, partner, ex-husband, ex-partner, or whoever is currently physically hurting you. 1. Do you prefer to answer these questions in English? 2. Has the physical violence increased in severity or frequency over the past year? 3. Does he own a gun? ____ 4. Does he threaten to kill you? 5. Is he violently and constantly jealous of you? For instance, does he say, "If I can't have you, no one can." 6. Do you feel ashamed of the things he does to you? ____ 7. Have you left him after living together during the past year? If you have never lived with him, check here:_ 8. Does he prevent you from going to school, or getting job training, or learning English? ____ 9. Are you married to him? ___ 10. Was your partner born in the United States? ____ 11. Has he threatened to report you to child protective services, immigration, or other authorities? 12. Has he ever used a weapon against you or threatened you with a lethal weapon? If yes, was the weapon a gun?; check here: ____ 13. Do you have a child that is not his? ____ 14. Has he ever forced you to have sex when you did not wish to do so? 15. Does he ever try to choke/strangle you or cut off your breathing? 15a. If yes, has he done it more than once, or did it make you pass out or black out or make you dizzy?; check here: ___ 16. Is he an alcoholic or problem drinker? 17. Does he threaten to harm your children? 18. Are you unemployed? 19. Have you attended college, vocational school and/or graduate school? 20. Add 1 point for each "yes" to questions 1-25	
Add 2 points for each "yes" to questions 2, 7, and 15a	
Add 3 points for each "yes" to questions 4-6	
Add 1 point for each "yes" to main questions 8-17	
Add 4 points for a "no" to question 26	- <u></u> -
Add 5 points for a "no" to question 27	- <u></u> -
Subtract 2 points for "yes" to 7a	
*questions 12a and 28 do not contribute to the score -

Sum all of the weighted scores for the DA-I Total Score _____

DA-I Total Score	Level of Danger	Interpretation of Danger Levels
0 – 14	Variable	Routine safety planning and monitoring. Inform victim that the level of risk can change quickly and to trust their instincts and to watch for additional signs of danger.
15 – 25	Increased	Safety planning and increased monitoring are important. Advise victim of increased risk and to watch for other signs of danger.
26 – 35	Severe	Advise victim that danger is severe. Be assertive with safety planning; consult with judges, high level of supervision recommendations, taking into account immigration status.
36 or more	Extreme	Advise victim of serious danger. Take assertive actions to protect victim – perhaps call for criminal justice or other professional help, taking into account immigration status; recommend highest bail, highest sentencing, highest probation supervision.
