The National Immigrant Women's Advocacy Project (NIWAP) (pronounced new-app) is seeking law enforcement and prosecutors with experience working with immigrant victims of domestic violence and/or sexual assault to increase the size of our team of national faculty for our Office on Violence Against Women (OVW) funded project and other national training opportunities on U and T Visa Certification, language access, and community collaboration. The OVW project provides inperson training and on-site technical assistance, webinars, and roundtables for law enforcement and prosecutors.

This training is designed to enhance law enforcement's and prosecutors' roles in protecting and serving immigrant communities and crime victims through improved language access, U visa certification and T visa endorsements.

- <u>Day One</u> Trainees will observe and participate in a full day training in Georgia.
- <u>Day Two and Three</u> Trainees will learn to implement the curriculum and develop adult learning skills.
