The National Immigrant Women's Advocacy Project (NIWAP, pronounced *new-app*) is a national provider of training, legal and social science research, policy development and technical assistance to advocates, attorneys, pro bono law firms, law schools, universities, federal, state and local law enforcement, prosecutors, judges, court staff, social services and health care providers, justice system personnel and other professionals who work with immigrant women, children and crime victims. We offer assistance on a broad range of issues including access to services, safety and legal rights.<sup>1</sup>

We Can Offer Training in Your Jurisdiction Best Practices: Immigrant Crime Victims, Language Access and the U Visa

NIWAP provides <u>free training</u> on the use of the U and T visa and crime scene language access best practices to improve law enforcement's and prosecutors' work with immigrant and limited English proficient (LEP) victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, and human trafficking.

The U and T Visas were created as a crime fighting tools that remove the fear of deportation and encourages immigrant crime victims to report crime victimization to police and participate in criminal investigations and prosecutions. Provision of language access to police assistance at crime scenes results in improved accuracy of police reports, better crime scene investigations and more successful prosecutions. This training will discuss how providing qualified interpreters at crime scenes and U visa certification play crucial roles in improving community, victim and law enforcement officer safety. Attendees will build their skills for effective use of the U visa and provision of language access when working with immigrant and Limited English Proficient victims and witnesses and to improve community policing in immigrant communities.

This training is funded by the U.S. Department of Justice, Office on Violence Against Women (OVW), and will review the use of innovative approaches that assist law enforcement and prosecutors in using the U visa and language access as vital crime fighting tools to hold perpetrators accountable for violent crimes.

**NIWAP (pronounced** *new-app*) offers **technical assistance**, **training**, and **written materials** to judges, law clerks, court staff, state court educators, and state court administrators on topics that assist courts in family, juvenile, civil and criminal court cases involving foreign born litigants that include victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, child and elder abuse, and human trafficking. We specialize on how immigration laws intersect with state family, protection order, custody, child support, public benefits and language access laws.

**NIWAP's Technical Assistance Staff:** Technical assistance to courts and judges is offered by a national team of judges with expertise in hearing cases involving immigrant litigants in family, juvenile and criminal court and by NIWAP's staff who were involved in drafting the immigration crime victims' protections in the Violence Against Women Act and who have expertise representing immigrant victims in family law and immigration matters.

### Our technical assistance covers the following topics:

- **Legal rights** of immigrant women and children and victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, child abuse, elder abuse, human trafficking, and other crimes;
- <u>Family Law:</u> Special issues that arise in family court cases involving immigrants including civil protection orders, custody, child and spousal support, divorce, termination of parental rights and Special Immigrant Juvenile Status;
- <u>Immigration Options for Immigrant Crime Victims:</u> Violence Against Women Act, U –visa crime victim, T –visa trafficking victim immigration relief, U visa certification by judges, and VAWA confidentiality protections that limit immigration enforcement at courthouses and state court discovery of information about federal immigration cases;
- Access to Public Benefits and Victim Services: Immigrant access to federal and state-funded public benefits, health care, housing, educational benefits, victim services, the civil and criminal justice systems;
- <u>Language Access:</u> Improving access for limited English proficient women, children and crime victims to assistance from police, prosecutors, courts, victim services, the justice, health care and social services systems;
- Referrals to programs nation-wide with experience and expertise serving immigrant crime victims;
- Trainings and training materials: on legal rights and culturally and linguistically accessible court services;
- <u>Strategies and Best Practices</u> for state, local or federal court systems in improving access to justice for immigrant crime victims and immigrant crime victims and immigrant children.
